Junior School Curriculum



I can hardly believe that we are half-way through the year already. The Junior School has had a fantastic start to the year and the teachers have been hard at work ensuring lots of fantastic learning opportunities for all of the students.

This year has seen the roll out of the InitaLit program from Foundation to Year 2. This program forms our core


literacy instruction across these early years and ensures that all students are being introduced to reading and writing in a structured and sequenced way. The program is really fun, with lots of games and songs and the kids have enjoyed all of the storybook lessons that accompany the program. We have seen some really pleasing results from the students and are looking forward to seeing what the second half of the year brings.

Our other big piece of work this semester has been the implementation of the MacqLit program. This program supports students in Years 3-6 who have been identified as needing extra help with their reading. Students work in small groups to consolidate their knowledge and practice the skills needed for reading. After only 9 weeks of implementation, we have already seen encouraging results, with every student showing growth in their reading abilities.

As usual, there is a lot going on behind the scenes for the Junior School teachers to build our skills and develop our practice. We have revamped how we use the VCOP program, have taken part in a writing moderation session and rolled out a fluency routine in line with the Science of Reading research. This year has also seen the Junior School phase out the GGSA Maths program with teachers utilising new and exciting resources to support their maths teaching across the early primary years.

It has been a privilege to work with and support these teachers this semester, as they develop and try new things to best support our students. I cannot wait to see the gains that we can make in Semester 2!

Year 1 / 2 - Mrs Cook



This term has flown by, and we have had so much fun learning together.

In Literacy, we have been making great progress with our Initial Lit program and are enjoying reading a range of story books. This term we have been writing persuasive texts and learning how to convince people to do what we want! We have written about taking up a 3-day weekend and have even persuaded Ms Mila to buy a

pet dog. Now we need to persuade her to bring the new puppy in to visit us at school.

In Maths, we are continuing to look at numbers all the way up to 1 000. We have learnt all about 2D shapes this term as well as how to read the clock. We have also practiced making and reading maps. We have used the Beebots to practice giving directions step by step and have had lots of fun programming them to move around our classroom.

This term, we have also looked at where our food comes from and examined how wheat is grown and turned into flour to make bread. We finished our learning by baking bread in our classroom and enjoying our delicious warm bread with butter for recess. We also looked at how supermarkets package their products and discussed ways that they could cut down how much plastic they use.

In Chrisitan Studies, we thought about what a church is. We've looked at different churches around Ceduna and the world and also what the Bible tells us about the church. Jesus taught us and his disciples to regularly meet to talk about God, sing about God and support each other.

As well as all this learning, we have taken part in the Footsteps program and watched a Puppet Show that visited our school. We read Bowerbird Blues as part of Simultaneous Story Time and made lots of different nests for the bowerbird in the story. We have also welcomed a new staff member to our class and are so lucky to have Jane McGuiness helping us in our room. We are so grateful for all her efforts thus far.





























Why peer relationships are so important for our girls!

When we talk about positive relationships for adolescent girls, the focus tends to be on teaching them about healthy dating practices. But the reality is, positive peer relationships can be even more important for teen girls than romantic relationships.

During the pre-teen and teen years, girls begin to move from focusing on their family relationships to prioritizing their peer relationships. As they begin to have their own opinions and experiences, they want to connect with peers who have similar interests. Having positive peer relationships can help healthy teen development and build important interpersonal skills that will benefit them later in life.

The Benefits of Positive Peer Relationships

As our daughters become more independent and begin creating their own understanding of the world, we want to make sure that they are surrounding themselves with people who will support them and help keep them responsible and engaged. Here are just a few of the ways your daughter benefits from her peer relationships:

It is crucial for young women to learn the importance of surrounding themselves with friends who lift them up. The adolescent years can be prime time for queen bees and frenemies, but by teaching your daughter to be aware of these negative "friendships" she can better navigate those social situations. Encourage her to find friends who celebrate her accomplishments, and teach her to celebrate her friends as well. When your daughter feels emotionally safe in her friend group, it can help boost her confidence and self-esteem. A strong sense of self can also inspire her to step out of her comfort zone to try new things and she learns and grows.

Having a close group of friends is also a way that adolescent girls can check in with their own moral compass. If they are heading towards a choice that could have negative consequences, a healthy group of friends can provide some positive peer pressure. It is one thing for a parent to tell her not to stay out past curfew, but if friends are also following curfew and know the importance of boundaries, she is more likely to follow those rules.

A group of friends can also benefit your daughter's mental health. Feelings of alienation can lead to depression or anxiety. When your daughter is feeling connected to a healthy friend group, she can feel safe enough to talk to them about problems that they may not want to talk to parents about. Maybe it's romantic troubles or school struggles, but friends she can trust will provide an outlet for her to process those issues. It is important to cultivate positive relationships with your daughter's friends yourself. If these friends care about your daughter and understand the importance of her family relationships as well, they will feel more comfortable coming to speak with you if your daughter is struggling with something beyond their scope.




