


















Fete Festivities:

At the school Fete we also had student work on display and sold 18 artworks to the local community. Two of our senior girls were also commissioned to create more artwork for a lady from Adelaide.







Tui's works are influenced by Picasso and American artist Basquiat. Students explored a range of faces and creatures to produce bold, bright final works based on their favourite artist.


















Crossways Choirs



Thankyou to the Crossways staff, students and community for making me feel so welcome in my first year here. I have thoroughly enjoyed being available to be a listening ear for many students, staff and parents and provide support with learning, friendships, behaviour, parenting and resolving issues.

We have been able to create a wellbeing space in one of the rooms off the Art room which has been used for quiet time, running small group meetings with students, and has allowed students a safe and calm environment if they have needed a break.

We have had a team of staff available to support student wellbeing this year and it has been great to see students have this one-on-one time and support, to be able to regulate their emotions, have a chat and return to their learning.

As a school we have a restorative approach to dealing with behaviour. Whole class circles have been run with different year levels on a range of topics including; respectful relationships, classroom expectations, friendships, bullying and Safe play.

The wellbeing role is a vital one in the school environment. Students need support to feel safe and included which then enhances their social and emotional development.
